Dear Fraser Families.

I hope you had a restful and rejuvenating spring break, and are ready to finish the school year strong. As we move forward, it's hard to believe how quickly time seems to be flying. While summer break may feel just around the corner, we are preparing for a busy and productive summer filled with important bond projects.

During the past months, we have laid the groundwork to begin construction and major upgrades as soon as school lets out in June. One key project is the demolition of the existing chiller and pad, and the installation of new HVAC network control cabling at Richards Middle School. In the coming weeks, a

new chiller will be installed, which will provide consistent indoor temperatures throughout the year.

A major portion of the RMS flat roof will also be replaced, as well as full roof replacements at Disney and Emerson elementary schools. LED lighting will be completed throughout RMS, Disney, and Emerson as we proceed through the coming months.

One of the most significant projects this summer will be replacing the entire parking lot at Fraser High School, along with nearly all of the concrete sidewalks throughout the campus.

We'll also be updating technology, including iPads for K-2 students and

elementary staff, and security cameras. These bond projects are essential to making our district safer, stronger, and more conducive to learning. They will provide lasting benefits to our students and staff for years to come.

Thank you for your continued support as we work to improve our schools and learning environments.

CONFERENCES CELEBRATE LEARNING

Elementary spring conferences took on a fresh new format, transforming into an open house-style celebration of learning, where students took the lead in discussing their educational journey.

Students proudly guided their families into their classrooms, showcasing their progress since the fall conferences. They reflected on their goals, presented their work, and highlighted their achievements. Teachers were present, circulating to offer support and encouragement as needed.

While Fraser has successfully implemented student-led conferences in the fall for several years, this was the first time the approach extended to spring conferences. Additionally, the introduction of an open house format further empowered students to take ownership of their learning, actively engaging in goal-setting and self-assessment. This shift fostered deeper, more meaningful conversations among students, teachers, and families.

This initiative aligns with the district's strategic plan and the Portrait of a Graduate, ensuring students develop the skills and values our community envisions for Fraser High School graduates.

As part of the process, many students created ePortfolios in Canvas, guiding their families through their work and demonstrating their growth. Students will continue these ePortfolios as they progress through the grades, providing a valuable record of their learning journey.

The response was overwhelmingly positive, with schools reporting significantly higher attendance at spring

conferences than in previous years. Given its success, the district plans to continue this format in the future, further strengthening the connection between students, families, and educators.



FHS Charity Week

Each year, student groups at Fraser High School come together to raise funds for a charitable cause. This year, they were proud to support the Fraser VFW as their Charity of the Year. Students selected the VFW to honor and assist veterans—a group they had not previously focused on.



Many students have a personal connection to someone who has served or know someone who does. Recognizing that veterans are often overlooked, students wanted to show their appreciation by raising funds specifically for our local Fraser VFW chapter.

To achieve their goal of \$10,000, the students set up fundraisers at restaurants, held sporting events and coin wars, sold T-shirts, and sold students tickets to skip a class and participate in a fun activity.

At the end of the week, students presented the Fraser VFW with a check for \$11,000!

The editor-in-chief, Dawson Sarcona, has overseen *The Welkin* during the entirety of his high school career. His commitment to the magazine helped them achieve this award.

"It's an honor to see my efforts, and the work of everyone who contributed art and writing to this magazine, recognized," Sarcona said.

The REALM program publicly recognizes excellent literary magazines produced by students with the support of their teachers. REALM is designed to encourage all schools to develop literary magazines that celebrate the art and craft of writing.

MSBOA DISTRICT XVI BAND FESTIVAL SUCCESS

Congratulations to the Richards Middle School 8th Grade Band for their outstanding performance at the District XVI Michigan School Band & Orchestra Association (MSBOA) Band Festival. The event, held at Warren Woods Tower High School, featured 73 RMS band students who demonstrated their musical growth and skills on stage.

Bands at the festival are evaluated by three judges for their performance and by one judge for sight-reading. Each ensemble is assessed in five musical categories: Tone, Intonation, Rhythm, Technique, and Interpretation, receiving ratings from A to E. The judges then assign an overall rating from First Division (Superior) to Fifth Division.

On February 29, the 8th Grade Band delivered an excellent performance, earning an overall Second Division rating! Their dedication and perseverance have led to remarkable progress, not only in their musical abilities but also in their performance etiquette.

SVMA CHORAL FESTIVAL TRIUMPH

The Richards Middle School
Choir also had an exciting and
historic moment at the Michigan
School Vocal Music Association
[MSVMA] District 16 Choral
Festival. Held on March 10 at
Stoney Creek High School, the
event marked the first time
RMS competed in this
prestigious festival.

A total of 54 choir students from 7th and 8th grades participated, performing under the scrutiny of three performance judges and one sight-reading judge. Their evaluation was based on six criteria: Tone Quality, Pitch, Rhythm, Diction, Interpretation, and Presentation.

Out of a possible 120 points, the RMS Choir achieved an impressive score of 99, earning them a Division 1 rating! This incredible achievement is a testament to the students' hard work and commitment to refining their musical literacy and performance skills throughout the year.

MSBOASTATE SOLO & ENSEMBLE RESULTS

Fourteen events qualified for State at the District Solo & Ensemble Festival on February 1.

The soloists in grades 10, 11, and 12 compete at a sequenced proficiency level, which include performing a solo piece, memorized scales, and sight-reading music they have never seen before.


The proficiencies get increasingly more difficult as they progress by grade. For the proficiency ratings, a First Division is a score of 85 to 100, and a Second Division is a score of 70 to 84.



ALL 14 events that qualified for State received "Superior" First Division ratings, equivalent to the overall grade of an "A"!

Included in the State competition were six chamber ensembles, each comprising of nine to 20 students, for a total of 76 ensemble members. Their talent, hard work, and dedication are exemplary!


