These items are a small way we show our Board how much they are appreciated. On behalf of Fraser Public Schools, we thank each Board member for their commitment to Fraser's students and staff.




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Screenagers: Growing Up in the Digital Age

CURRICULUM CORNER

STUDENT SUPPORT INCLUDES ACADEMIC AND AFFECTIVE FOCUS

he transition to 9th grade can be challenging, both academically and socially. In the 2016-17 school year, a team of teachers and administrators introduced Rambler Academics, an intervention course with a mission to help students build a strong foundation for success at Fraser High School.

"What makes this program different from most every program you see in other schools is that we focus on the academic need on one day, then we focus on affective or goal setting, problem solving, and growth mindset the other day. What skills do you need when you're an adult that we can teach you right now?" said FHS Principal Dr. Mike Lonze.

Students rotate between independent work and small groups based on the skills they need to remediate from either English 9 or Algebra I.

"Schools often have programs designed to support those students who really struggle, as well as programs to support their highest achievers. Our Rambler Academics class provides FHS with a unique opportunity to support our 'bubble' students who might otherwise be overlooked," said Helena Fisher, Multi Tiered Systems of Support Coordinator at FHS. "These are students who might blend into the background in a class of 30, but they can shine in this smaller setting."

Students are placed into the course based on a variety of factors during their 8th-grade year, including assessments, discipline referrals and teacher recommendations.

Since the introduction of Rambler Academics, which meets daily instead of every-other day, the academic achievement and behavior of the

students in the class has improved. Additionally, by having executive functioning skills embedded into the course, the students' critical thinking and problem solving skills are helping them grow into leaders in other classes, student activities and the community.

During the 2016-17 school year, 83 students were enrolled in the course. Thirty-eight of those students failed fewer classes than their 8th-grade year and seven students received fewer discipline referrals. One of the biggest gains noted was that 30 students did not fail one content-area course in their 9th-grade year.

Ms. Fisher attributes the course's success to the variety of support integrated into it.

"We don't just offer suggestions and say 'Here, these are good things to do.' We are able to provide the time for students to actually do it," she said.

Fraser Public Schools is proud to welcome back Dr. Rick Repicky as the interim principal of Fraser High School. Dr. Repicky previously held that position from 1997 through 2002.



Dr. Repicky is returning to Fraser, where he spent 31½ of his 37 years in education. As a teacher, he worked at Kennedy and Richards junior high schools, as well as Fraser High School. He also was fortunate to coach the '83 Rambler state champion hockey team.

Dr. Repicky's administrative career in Fraser began in January of 1987 when he began a 9½ year stint as athletic director. He then spent a year as a high school assistant principal before serving five years as principal. His final move was to the superintendent's office from 2002 until his retirement in 2010.

FHS Students Compete and Give Back at BPA Regional Competition

Twenty-three Fraser High School Business Professional of America members joined 400 other BPA students for the 2018 Region 4 Leadership Conference. Baker College of Auburn Hills hosted the students who came from 15 schools in Macomb and Oakland counties. During a day of computerized tests, team events, individual presentations and networking, the students were able to give back in a variety of charitable breakout activities.

WHAT'S THE MATTER?

Edison Elementary has been popping into action to not only learn what makes something matter, but how to measure its weight and volume.

A recent lesson had 5th-grade students creating their own question, coming up with a plan, and performing an experiment to find data to support a conclusion using popcorn kernels.

Students learn the states of matter, primarily solid, liquid or gas, and the key characteristics of each form. They also discover how temperature affects different states of matter.

"Students have been enjoying a more hands-on approach to science with the new matter unit...especially the first lesson in which they made and discussed whether slime is a solid or liquid!" commented their teacher, Mrs. Elizabeth Schmidt.








THIRD GRADE PRESENTS READERS' THEATER

Twain Elementary 3rd-grade teachers, Ms. Pamela Offer and Mrs. Megan Cracchiolo, alternate each week having their students practice reading a play script. The students then read the short play to other classes in the library. Parents are also invited to listen to their child read.
