CURRICULUM CORNER

SECONDARY COURSE OFFERINGS

We are excited to adjust our middle school and high school offerings with the addition of some new courses for our students. The School Board approved the addition of these courses during the January meeting. These courses will provide our students more flexibility with their schedules, intentional focus on interests, and a unique opportunity at the high school to start early on a potential wage-earning career.

The following are the new courses approved for Richards Middle School:

2-D Art and 3-D Art – These two courses take the place of Art 7 and Art 8. The implementation of these two courses will allow students to focus on a specific type of art they enjoy. Additionally, it will allow them the capability to take the course in 7th grade, 8th grade, or both.

Advanced Physical Education – This is a brand-new course that extends our 8th-grade offerings. This course is designed for students who want to go beyond the entry-level experience that general Physical Education provides to all our students.

The following is the new course approved for Fraser High School:

Hybrid Introduction to Sports Officiating – This course is offered to 10th- through 12th-grade students. During this course, students will be trained to referee three different sports – basketball, volleyball, and one yet to be determined. Students will get interactive training via the RefReps curriculum and complete each unit with the MHSAA certification assessment. All fees for the assessment are waived by MHSAA for taking this course. Upon passing the certification, students will immediately be able to start officiating events for MHSAA and begin what could be a full career in sports officiating.

Fraser Public Schools is excited to offer these new electives. We continue to look for opportunities for our students to enhance their skills in areas of their interests.

Celebrating Career Technical Education

February was CTE Month and Fraser High School celebrated by honoring two outstanding students of the year and one business partner of the year.

Edison Benefits from New LITERACY RESOURCES

Excitement is building in Edison Elementary K-2 classrooms as teachers continue to utilize a wealth of new literacy materials provided by the district in recent years.

These resources – Bridge to Reading, decodable texts, interactive readalouds, and training in DRI/small group instruction – are transforming the way our youngest learners engage with reading and writing.

With Bridge to Reading, students are developing essential phonemic awareness and foundational literacy skills through structured, engaging lessons. Decodable texts give children the opportunity to apply their phonics knowledge in meaningful ways, building confidence as they read independently. Interactive read-alouds bring stories to life, fostering a love for literature and expanding students' comprehension skills.

Additionally, teachers have received training in DRI (Differentiated Reading



Instruction) and small group instruction, allowing them to tailor lessons to meet each child's individual needs. This focused, research-based approach ensures that all students – whether they're just beginning to recognize letters or are already reading short books – receive the support they need to grow as readers.

By immersing students in these rich literacy experiences, our dedicated teachers are laying the foundation for a lifetime of learning. It's inspiring to see how these new resources are helping our young readers thrive!

held at the DeVos Place in Grand Rapids, Michigan! He was accepted among the 2764 students who auditioned for a seat in one of the five All-State ensembles.






