Track and Field Projects Wrap Up Scheduled Bond Projects

When workers painted the lines on the newly resurfaced track in July 2021, the final project of the 2017 bond was completed.

The replacement of the stadium turf and resurfacing the track were the last scheduled projects of the \$29.37 million bond.

The old turf was removed in fall 2020, and the new turf was installed in time for commencement on June 12. The following week, the track work began. Crews replaced the 100-yard dash section, then sprayed a new coating on the entire track. Rain caused a few minor delays, but in late July the finishing touches were installed and the track re-opened.

During the last four years, bond projects have touched every building in the district. At the elementary schools and Dooley Center, projects included air conditioning in the gyms, new playground equipment and classroom upgrades. Richards Middle School also received air conditioning in the gym, new clocks throughout the school and a new roof over the 80s wing. The pool, locker rooms and auditorium at Fraser High School were fully renovated.

Throughout the district, gutters were redirected to prevent water buildup on sidewalks, parking lots and sidewalks were replaced, the technology infrastructure was upgraded, and every classroom received a Promethean panel. The district also purchased flexible furniture for many classrooms.

Teacher Cadet Program Provides On-The-Job Experience for FHS Students



Fraser High School junior Alexis Serio isn't sure if she wants to pursue a teaching career, but the hands-on experience she's gaining in the Teacher Cadet program is helping her figure it out. Along with 11 other juniors and seniors, and even one Class of 2021 graduate, Serio is working directly with students and teachers in the elementary summer scholars program.

"I'm having a lot of fun," Serio said. "I'm learning how to take care of little kids, and even if I don't become a teacher, that will help me."

It's a paid position, and the cadets have check-ins and an evaluation from summer school director Ms. Dayna Taylor. The feedback she has received from the teachers has proven the program has value. "They love the extra help and the extra set of hands," Ms. Taylor said. "The teachers like to see that students are interested in going into teaching as a profession."

The Career Technical Education Department at FHS has a goal to provide students career experiences before they graduate. This is the first year Fraser has offered the Teacher Cadet program, which compliments the Future Teacher courses at FHS.

"The cadets have done small group work for both reading and math, engaged with the students using new strategies they've learned in their training, played with them outside, and brought in surprises for students on occasions," said summer scholars teacher Mrs. Stephanie McGuffey. "The influence and interactions the cadets have had with our elementary students has been amazing! My hope is that through these four-week programs, they are seeing the return and this experience is supporting preparations for their future."

"I knew I wanted to be a teacher from first grade," Ms. Taylor said. "But if something like this would have been available to me, I would have loved it."

NON-HOMESTEAD MILLAGE REPLACEMENT AND RESTORATION

Fraser Public Schools is asking voters to approve a replacement and restoration of the current non-homestead operating millage. This proposal will NOT impact the taxes on owner-occupied homes in our district. Only second or rental homes, commercial properties and industrial properties are affected.

- Is an existing levy on commercial, business and rental properties in our school district
- Has no impact on homeowners' property taxes
- Provides 9.5% of the operating funds for Fraser Public Schools each year
- Is required to receive the full foundation allowance established by the state
- Is funding that goes directly to the district to help pay operational costs to educate students

The non-homestead millage makes up approximately \$5.7 million of the Fraser Public Schools' \$59.9 million annual budget.

Renewal of the non-homestead millage is essential to maintaining current programs offered by the district. If this funding is lost, the district cannot replace it with any other funding source. While primary households are not affected by this millage, state law requires a district-wide election to approve the millage.

- Fraser voters last approved the nonhomestead operating millage in 2014
- The restoration is for a period of 20 years
- This is a tax assessed against businesses and second homes, NOT homeowners
- All residents in the Fraser Public Schools district vote on the renewal
- This money is used for district operations
- This money cannot be replaced by other funding sources

FRASER EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION BENEFITS TEACHERS, STUDENTS

"I want all Fraser students to be able to find books on the shelves with which they can personally identify," Ms. Lori Wetzel said in her grant application to the Fraser Educational Foundation (FEF). "I want them to find characters that look like them and share common experiences."

Ms. Wetzel, the K-8 Media Specialist in the district, received \$1,000 from the FEF to purchase books for the media centers at Richards Middle School and all elementary schools. The books included characters from commonly underrepresented populations.

The FEF is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization and relies entirely on fundraisers and donations to fund its mission of providing grants to Fraser employees that enhance teacher creativity, student enrichment and community involvement. The projects that are selected will usually benefit a whole class or school, and the impact will be felt for several years.

Each year, all employees in Fraser Public Schools are eligible to apply for a competitive grant from the FEF.

Along with Ms. Wetzel's grant, the FEF awarded two others. Ms. Sara Belvedere received \$450 to purchase flexible seating for her classroom at Fraser High School and Ms. Kelly Zombo received \$1,500 to launch a thinkerspace at Eisenhower Elementary School.

The foundation is made up of current and retired employees, as well as former board of education members and community members.

ALL FAMILIES ENCOURAGED TO COMPLETE FREE, REDUCED MEALS APPLICATION

During the 2021-2022 school year, all students will again be eligible for free breakfast and lunch during the school day. However, families are still encouraged to complete the free and reduced price meals application before October 15.

The district receives funding that supports a variety of programs based on the number of families who qualify for free or reduced-price meals. Additionally, families who complete the application may be eligible for programs and services from other organizations.

We encourage everyone to participate in free meals this school year. Many families have expressed concern about it taking away from children that are truly in need, but there is enough funding to cover all meals, and we will have enough food available. Families are still welcome to send in a lunch from home if they would prefer.

Café 202 Teaches Elementary Students Job, Life Skills

One part of the curriculum Ms. Alyssa McNamara teaches to her students is life skills, including working with others, following directions and handling money. "I wanted to come up with a way to put our life skills to good use and build a community within our school during such a crazy year," she said.

In the spring of 2021, her class in room 202 at Edison Elementary launched Café 202, a twice-a-week mobile coffee and smoothie cart for the staff. Every Friday, students would apply for the different jobs available: barista, delivery coordinator, delivery, cashier and cleanup crew. Monday morning jobs were announced, followed by training before the café was open on Tuesday and Thursday.

The Edison staff would place an order for coffee or the weekly special, and students would prepare and deliver it.

"Café 202 was showered with so much love and support from the staff at Edison, I was nearly brought to tears some days. Seeing my students on the job and interacting with adults throughout the building was absolutely priceless," she said.

The earnings will be used to buy sensory items, seating and equipment. Before the school year ended, they had earned enough to make a purchase. The class voted on what to buy, and a



mini trampoline won by a landslide. Even though they only had it for a few weeks, students used it during brain breaks and to get the wiggles out.

Ms. McNamara hopes during this school year they earn enough to help build a sensory room that all Edison students can use.

"I think my favorite part was seeing my students recognize how capable they are," she said. "I saw so much growth in their confidence and willingness to talk to adults."

THE GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE IS ESTABLISHED TO MEET THE REQUIREMENTS OF TITLE II OF THE AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT OF 1990, TITLE VI OF THE EDUCATION AMENDMENT ACT OF 1972, TITLE IX OF THE EDUCATION AMENDMENT ACT OF 1972, SECTION 504 OF THE REHABILITATION ACT OF 1973, AND THE AGE DISCRIMINATION ACT OF 1975.

Section I: Any person may use this grievance procedure to file a complaint of discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability or age in the programs or activities that are provided by Fraser Public Schools. The grievance may be brought forward to the Local Civil Rights Coordinator, who is identified by name and job title as:

Section II: The person who believes he/she has a valid basis for grievance shall discuss the grievance informally and on a verbal basis with the local Civil Rights Coordinator, who shall, in turn, investigate the complaint and reply with an answer to the complainant. He/she may initiate formal procedures according to the following steps.

Step 1: A written statement of the grievance signed by the complainant shall be submitted to the Local Civil Rights Coordinator within five (5) business days of receipt of answers to the informal complaint. The Local Civil Rights Coordinator shall further investigate the grievance and reply in writing to the complainant within five (5) days.

Step 2: If the complainant wishes to appeal the written decision of the Local Civil Rights Coordinator, he/she may submit a signed statement of appeal to the Superintendent of Schools within five (5) business days after receipt of the Coordinator's response. The Superintendent shall meet with all parties involved, formulate a conclusion, and respond in writing to the complainant within ten (10) business days after receipt of the coordinator's response.

Step 3: If the complainant remains unsatisfied, he/she may appeal through a signed, written statement to the Board of Education within five (5) business days of his receipt of the Superintendent's response in Step 2. In an attempt to resolve the grievance, the Board of Education shall meet with the concerned parties

and their representative within forty (40) days of the receipt of such an appeal. A copy of the Board's disposition of the appeal shall be sent to each concerned party within ten (10) days of this meeting.

Step 4: If at this point the grievance has not been satisfactorily settled, further appeal may be made to the Office for Civil Rights, Department of Education, 600 Superior Avenue East, Suite 750, Cleveland, OH 44114.

Inquiries concerning the non-discrimination policy may be directed to Office for Civil Rights, Department of Education, 600 Superior Avenue East, Suite 750, Cleveland, OH 44114.

The local Civil Rights Coordinator, on request, will provide a copy of the District's grievance procedure and investigate all complaints in accordance with this procedure.

A copy of each of the Acts and the regulations on which this notice is based may be found in the Local Civil Rights Coordinator's office.

AHERA (ASBESTOS HAZARD EMERGENCY RESPONSE ACT)

The Environmental Protection Agency has determined that airborne asbestos fibers can be a health hazard. The Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) was passed in 1986. District buildings are monitored every six months and inspected every three years to comply with AHERA regulations. The last inspection was completed in 2016. Updated Management Plans are located in the office of each building and in the Operations & Maintenance Building. Each Plan shows asbestos-related work that has occurred in each building.

REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND SEX EDUCATION INSTRUCTION – STATE AID ACT, 1766A

The Board of Education has established a program of health instruction which includes reproductive health and other sex education instruction, as well as serious communicable disease prevention education.

According to applicable law, parents/guardians have the right to review materials or observe classroom instruction; please contact your student's school principal.

This statute also allows you to excuse your child from participation in classes which include such instruction, if you choose. If you wish to exercise your right to excuse your student from this instruction, please send written notice to your student's school principal.

BADGE SYSTEM FOR VISITORS, VOLUNTEERS AND GUEST TEACHERS

For security purposes, the District is continuing its practice of requiring all visitors, volunteers and guest teachers to wear an identification badge while in any school building. All persons entering a school building are requested to immediately report to the main office to obtain an identification badge.



FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that Fraser Public Schools, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, Fraser Public Schools may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Fraser Public Schools to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- Honor roll or other recognition lists:
- Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with the following information: names, addresses and telephone listings unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

If you do not want Fraser Public Schools to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing by the end of the second week of the school year. Fraser Public Schools has designated the following information as directory information:

- Electronic mail address
- Photograph
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- Degrees, honors and awards received
- Major field of study
- The most recent educational agency
- Dates of attendance and institution attended
- Grade level
- Student ID number, user ID or other unique personal identifier used to communicate in electronic systems that cannot be used to access education records without a PIN, password, etc. (A student's SSN, in whole or in part, cannot be used for this purpose.)

DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS

Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1996 (amends Michigan Public Health code) Public 174 of 1994

The "drug-free zone" surrounding school property is 1,000 feet. Any individual who delivers cocaine, narcotics or certain other illicit substances to a minor student within the 1,000-foot drug-free zone around the school property shall be punished by at least two years in prison and up to three times the term of imprisonment and fine — or both — that would otherwise apply. "School Property" is defined as a "building, playing field or property used for school purposes to impart instruction to children in kindergarten through grade 12, when provided by a public, private, denominational or parochial school, except those buildings used primarily for adult education or college extension courses."

PEST MANAGEMENT PLAN

Dear Parent/Guardian: As a part of the Fraser Public Schools Pest Management Program, pesticides are occasionally applied. You have the right to be informed prior to any pesticide application made to the school grounds and buildings. In certain emergencies, pesticides may be applied without prior notice, but you will be provided notice following any such application. If you need prior notification, you may notify the school district in the following ways:
