Learning is Flourishing in Fraser



Our buildings are closed, but the eagerness to learn is being met with open hearts and open minds in Fraser Public Schools. From preschool through high


school, our students, staff and families are working together and embracing extended online learning.

The students love any opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge in creative ways.

Several elementary teachers are seeing an influx in video recorded assignment submissions where students explain their new learning. They agreed that these make the grading process much more fun! It's great to see the students and hear what they have to say.

Students also seem to enjoy assignments in which they can draw pictures and diagrams or use household materials in creative ways in order to demonstrate learning. This experience has challenged staff, students and parents to utilize technology in new ways and leverage our digital ecosystem.

Fraser Public Schools was in a unique position to make the transition to extended online learning. Students were already familiar and comfortable with our learning management





systems — itslearning and Blackboard. And our supportive community helped create our 1:1 device environment many years ago. These tools, paired with GoToMeeting as a platform to connect, meant our district was able to quickly adapt to delivering all of our learning online.

Even our preschool families are connecting virtually. Teachers are hosting GoToMeetings where students can do show and tell, hear their teacher read a story, and participate in rhyming games and scavenger hunts while connecting with each other. Preschool families have also been receiving activity ideas to do during the week. Parents can use these activities with their children when time permits.

"We have been planning such fun and creative activities during this time at home and throughout the year!" said one parent whose child is in Mrs. Kari Pigula's preschool class.

Not only are kindergarten students sharing pictures for a Google scrapbook, but also they have been participating in hands-on science lessons. The children were connected to videos, a digital magazine and activities through Scholastic to learn all about the life cycle of a butterfly. Some went above and beyond to create the final activity of a life cycle using their fingerprints as the artwork!

Teachers in the district are benefiting from online learning as well.

CURRICULUM CORNER SUMMER LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

At Fraser Public Schools, we are committed to keeping our students learning throughout the summer. We are excited to offer a variety of virtual learning opportunities.

"We understand that students may have some gaps in their learning, and we also understand that children will need activities to keep busy since many summer camps will not be an option," said Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction Dr. Donna Anderson.

All students will be keeping their district-issued device during the summer to help facilitate learning.

Grade-level appropriate activities will be posted on our website for all students currently in grades DK-6. These optional activities will focus on both core academic areas, as well as our special areas. Parents will need to facilitate these opportunities with their children. We will also be inviting qualified current students to register for summer support in the following virtual programs. All of these opportunities will be virtual.

REMOTE SUMMER SCHOOL

Current K-6 students

We are excited to also offer identified, at-risk students a virtual remote summer school opportunity. Parents will be sent the information directly if their student qualifies.

Students will meet with a teacher 30 minutes a day, four days a week for 16 days. This program will focus on reading, writing, and math concepts.

MATH MINDSET

Current 3-7 students

In collaboration with the MISD, we will be offering a 20 day academic program to qualified students

that will consist of mathematical mindset messages, number talks to develop computational fluency, virtual classroom activities, along with several technology components. This program integrates engaging activities with interactive software to help correct students' misconceptions in mathematics and help develop a conceptual understanding of concepts needed to be successful in mathematics.

ALGEBRA READINESS

Current 7-8 students

Richards Middle School will offer the Algebra Readiness program to qualified students.

CREDIT RECOVERY

Current 9-11 students

Fraser High School will offer credit recovery in English, Social Studies, Science and Math.

LEARNING IS FLOURISHING IN FRASER

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Mark Twain Elementary. "Supporting parents and students through FaceTime, phone calls, text messages, video messages and virtual conferences has allowed us to work together to teach their kids the best that we can. 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Celebrating the CLASS OF 2020

The Fraser High School seniors have demonstrated tremendous class and great compassion during an extremely difficult time in history. All traditional senior events held in the spring have been affected by the restrictions on large gatherings and social distancing. The Fraser team – made up of principals, teachers, administrators and parents – are working together to celebrate the 318 seniors of the Class of 2020.

LAWN SIGNS

First, the high school provided every senior a Class of 2020 Graduate lawn sign. These signs were picked up in early May.

SENIOR CRUISE: MAY 19–21

The three-day cruise was an opportunity for our seniors and their families to celebrate as an alternative to the traditional Senior Walk. Students cruised to stations around FHS, turning in their MacBook and other items and picking up their cap and gown. Students were able to take pictures in front of the FHS banner and sign the Class of 2020 banner.

GRADUATION: JUNE 6

We do not expect social distancing guidelines to change before our originally scheduled commencement ceremony, nor do we want to keep postponing this event. That is why we will move forward with holding an event on June 6 in two parts.

Part One: Speeches and Graduate Introductions, 3:00 p.m.

The first part of the graduation ceremony will be pre-recorded and broadcast. It will include the traditional speeches and reading of all the seniors' names. We will share the viewing instructions with all of our Fraser families.



Part Two: Drive-Thru Graduation, 7:00 p.m.

The second part will be what we will call our Fraser Drive-Thru Graduation Ceremony, held on the football field at Fraser High School. This will be a new experience for us all, but it will allow for the Class of 2020 to come back home to FHS. Seniors will be allowed to exit their cars and receive their diplomas. This event will be recorded and shared with all of our Fraser families.

SENIOR GIFT

The Senior All Night Party Committee has transitioned from planning an event after the graduation ceremony to purchasing gifts for every senior. Since many of their fundraising events are not possible right now, they have created a GoFundMe to raise money online. Gifts will be passed out at graduation.

SENIOR ALL NIGHT PARTY FUNDRAISERS

It is a tradition at Fraser High School to host a Senior All Night Party the night of the graduation ceremony. But, because of the restrictions on large gatherings, this year's event had to be cancelled. The committee of parents that were organizing the event is now planning to purchase every senior a gift.

The committee raises money through various fundraisers, but the stay-at-home order also means most of those are not possible. Gifts will be passed out at graduation on June 6.

ONLINE FUNDRAISER

The committee organized an online fundraiser, which has raised more than \$12,000. An anonymous FHS alumnus also donated an additional \$3,000 to the committee.

EMPLOYEE HONORED FOR 50 YEARS OF SERVICE

On a sunny Friday in April, Dave Czanstke from the Operations and Maintenance Department celebrated 50 years of service with Fraser Public Schools. It was not a typical celebration — no fanfare, no balloons and, because of the coronavirus school closure, no coworkers there to celebrate with him.

Mr. Czanstke began his career with Fraser Public Schools in 1970 as an afternoon custodian at Fraser High School. Within a few years, he was promoted to Head Custodian at Salk Elementary. After 10 years at Salk, he was promoted to Head Custodian at Kennedy Junior High.

Junior High was closed and Mr. Czanstke and his crew moved to Richards Middle School. He and his crew spent the summer painting and moving furniture to the new school. David was moved to Eisenhower Elementary and worked there for approximately three months before he was awarded the Assistant Head Custodian position at Fraser High School, where he remained for 22 years.

Mr. Czanstke currently holds a skilled position in Operations and Maintenance. His hard work and efforts year after year are sincerely appreciated. 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MUSIC PROGRAMS Recognized for **Ninth Year in A Row**

Fraser Public Schools is honored to again be a Best Community for Music Education. The award, given by the NAMM Foundation, is a national recognition for districts with outstanding commitment to music education at all levels.

"Durning this unprecedented time when many traditions have been challenged, revised or cancelled, it is with great pride that the Fraser Performing Arts Department continues to be recognized for its 'Tradition of Excellence!' This award is truly a testament to the dedication and commitment of the exemplary performing arts staff, the support of the administration and Board of Education, the spirit of the community, and the outstanding students that fill the classrooms!" said Jim Rodgers, music department chair and high school band director.

The application process for the recognition looks at opportunities for students within both the district and the community, including after school and summer enrichment. In Fraser, the opportunities are seemingly endless. Students are eligible to participate in band beginning in 5th grade, and by the time they reach middle school, have several options for instrumental music, including concert band, drum line and jazz. Fraser High School offers even more opportunities for large and small group ensembles. The recognition looks at more than instrumental music, however. The unique partnership in Fraser between vocal and instrumental is one of the qualities that helped the district earn this distinction. Another thing is the sheer amount of participation in music programs.

Michigan History Day AWARD CEREMONY

The Michigan History Day awards ceremony went on as planned, despite the inability to meet in person. The virtual event was live streamed on Saturday, May 9.

Participation among Fraser students continues to grow — this year 28 students competed at the state level. Students competed in categories related to the theme of Breaking Barriers. All of the work was done outside of the normal school day. This year, students from Edison Elementary, Richards Middle School and Fraser High School participated in the competition.

Overall, 13 students will move on to the national contest and seven more are national alternates. Additionally, three Fraser projects were picked for special awards.

Richards Middle School teacher Ms. Tara Fugate was also named Michigan's nominee for the national Patricia Behring Teacher of the Year award. Each of the 58 National History Day affiliates may nominate one middle school teacher for this award.

Every nominee is a teacher who demonstrates a commitment to engaging students in historical learning through innovative use of primary sources, implementation of active learning strategies to foster historical thinking skills, and participation in the National History Day Contest.
