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Building a **Chain of Kindness**



This year, the Mark Twain Elementary 6th-grade team is focusing on building good character. Using the principles of restorative practices,

students start each day with a morning circle.

In these circles each student has an opportunity to share, and together they learn, discuss, set goals and demonstrate different character traits. They have started the year with a focus on kindness. This month, the students were challenged to create a chain of kindness.

Each time someone witnesses an act of kindness, that person writes it down on a paper link and together they add it to the chain. Throughout the year they will be focusing on integrity, empathy, perseverance and grit.

The students are learning that together we are a community of kind, considerate and hardworking 6th graders.

CURRICULUMCORNER

ANALYZING STATEWIDE ASSESSMENTS

Students in Fraser Public Schools continue to outperform their peers in Macomb County and Michigan on the statewide M-STEP assessment. The district received the data from the assessment that all students in grades 3–8 and 11 took this past April and May.

When ranked by the percentage who earned a score of proficient or higher, FPS students were in the top 10 in grades 3–7 for math and grades 5–7 for English language arts (ELA).

"We are starting to see some positive results from our focus on math in recent years," said Dr. Donna Anderson, Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction. "As we look at the data, we look for trends. This year, we noticed as students move up through the grades, Fraser's rank in the county also moves up."

Of note, the 7th-grade average was the fourth highest in the county for math. The 47.3 percent of 7th-grade students proficient on the math assessment was more than 11

percentage points higher than the state and county average.

In ELA, Fraser 7th-grade students also performed extremely well: 55.8 percent were proficient — about 13 percentage points higher than their peers.

"Once we receive our district data, we compare it to previous years, as well as to the state and county. This year, we are seeing that our students are gaining on their peers in the county. We believe our comprehensive multi-tiered systems of support process is allowing us to identify students in need and implement research-based programs to support them and help close the gaps."

Fraser 3rd-grade students' average percent proficient ranked 15th in the county for ELA. But, by 7th grade, that ranking increased to second.

The data also provides an opportunity for the district to identify areas of focus and those which need improvement. The district is working with the MISD to support teacher development in the area of K–6 literacy.

"We know that our Tier 1 reading instruction is a priority for us. We have scheduled professional learning opportunities related to literacy for our staff. This is very important with the Read by Grade Three law in effect this year," said Dr. Anderson.

At Richards Middle School, 8th-grade students took the PSAT last year. This test provides a baseline for students as they prepare for the SAT in 11th grade. Fraser students outperformed the county and state. RMS had 66.4 percent of students proficient or advanced on the evidence-based reading and writing portion of the test, and 43.8 percent in math. Both scores are about 3 percentage points higher than the county average.

Finally, in Fraser High School, students took the SAT this past April. The average score was 984.3, which was more than 9 points higher than the county average of 975.

FHS teachers and administrators worked with students and used PSAT data to help them prepare for the SAT. When comparing the 2018 PSAT 10 data with the 2019 SAT data, the average FHS score jumped 91 points while the statewide data saw an increase of 65 points.

"We understand that this is summative data that represents achievement on one specific assessment day," Dr. Anderson said. "In Fraser, we pride ourselves on looking at multiple data points which include analyzing our local benchmark scores and various student evidence."

Space and Environment Design at Eisenhower



As students and teachers settle into the school year, the Universal Design for Learning (UDL) model classrooms are starting to take root. At

Eisenhower Elementary, the kindergarten and 2nd-grade teachers received in-depth UDL training last year in order to better leverage classroom space and support all learners.

Both kindergarten and 2nd-grade students especially love using the new flexible seating. They are able to find their own space and have room to spread out. Seating options offer a variety of ways for children to feel

comfortable. In addition, the new seating options can be arranged quickly and easily to meet classroom needs depending on the type of work students are doing — including individual, small groups or whole groups.

The model classrooms will be used as we continue our UDL journey. Teachers will be sharing what works in order to help their colleagues and the district with future furniture decisions.

This school year, the 4th-grade team at Eisenhower, along with teams at every school, are continuing our UDL transformation.







Spreading Joy and Kindness



This year, 4th-grade students at Edison Elementary are teaming up to spread joy, kindness and appreciation

throughout their building and community with kindness projects. Each week, the students meet to reflect on past projects, brainstorm for the future and execute new ideas.

To date, they have created an appreciation jar for their principal, Mrs. Wiegand, and filled it with handwritten notes for her.

When asked how she felt creating the kindness project for Mrs. Wiegand, student Leah Domenicucci said, "I was really happy because I was doing something nice for someone and also excited about what she would think and say when she reads them!"

The 4th-grade students also decorated bookmarks for 3rd-grade students. Students are given homework each week to help them develop important skills like gratitude and kindness at home.

"I feel really good when I do kindness projects, because it makes other people happy," said student Matthew Loder.

Kindness projects will be continuing all year in 4th grade at Edison Elementary. Currently, they are working on a new project for the custodians and brainstorming what will come next. The students hope to reach everyone in the building throughout the school year and then spread to the community.



MINDFULNESS AND THE BRAIN



All 5th-grade students at Emerson Elementary were recently trained on the importance of mindfulness. District Intervention

Mentor Mrs. Laura Purdy led the training on Mindfulness and the Brain, and taught students to understand the connection between their brain, emotions and learning. Giving students a basic understanding of how the brain works and how emotions and feelings impact the brain and learning creates the opportunity for better emotional regulation.

Mindfulness is essentially the practice of being present in each moment, creating a relaxed and aware state of mind. It's about noticing and observing emotions and thoughts without judgement and viewing yourself from a place of compassion.

Students learn that when they practice mindfulness, it can be a tool to calm down their brains and bodies and get them prepared to be better learners and less reactive and better people in general.

Restorative Practices



Throughout the last year, the district has been committed to training staff on restorative practices. This approach

to building a stronger community within classrooms, schools and the district also helps minimize and resolve conflicts when they arise.

The Salk Elementary 5th-grade team is using these practices in their classrooms.



Ms. Ashley Fenech, Mr. Kerry Hitchings and Ms. Kelli Provost start their day with morning meetings and circle time. These meetings help the students learn how communication is an important part of everyday life.

Students "circle up" into two circles facing each other. The students are given a choice of a few different discussion prompts to talk about with the student facing them.

The inner circle then moves over a few spaces and uses another prompt to have a conversation with a new partner. This continues and allows students to talk with students they may not otherwise talk to.

The teachers use the circles to incorporate the importance of many character traits, including empathy, kindness, respect, honesty and compassion.

It is evident that students are excited about the circles, when the most asked question throughout the day is, "When are we going to be 'circling up' today?"

Mat Man



To prepare to learn to write, DK students at the Dooley Center are working on mastering important concepts which

will make writing easier. These concepts, or readiness skills, include size recognition, placement and sequencing skills.

As students listen to the directions in the song "Mat Man," they take turns using wooden pieces to create Mat Man. They name the parts of the body as they build him and learn sequencing. Other skills are simultaneously



promoted during this activity, including body awareness, socialization and sharing.

When the children learn to build Mat Man they can easily approach writing in the same way.
