
extra curricular activities and on the field of competition.

#### Emerson's New Mascot



## Fraser High School Students Achieve MOS Certification Milestone

Fraser High School is fortunate to have recently been selected to participate in the IT Education Grant, a \$3.9 million grant, appropriated by the Michigan Legislature to be expended over three years. The Microsoft IT Academy and Certification Program was selected to meet the legislative requirements for this grant. The Microsoft IT Academy bridges the world of education and work. 


## Softball

## Track


