SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fraser Families,

I hope the New Year is off to a wonderful start for you and your family. At Fraser Public Schools, we have been hard at work with the implementation of year one of our District strategic plan which calls for the development of structural framework to allow students



to move through their academic learning based upon demonstration of competency in each of the subject areas. According to the education experts at **Competency Works**, Competency Based Learning (CBL) refers to systems of instruction, assessment, grading and academic reporting that are based on students' demonstrating that they have learned the knowledge and skills they are expected to learn as they progress through their education.

In public schools, competency-based systems use state learning standards to determine academic expectations and define "competency with proficiency" in a given course, subject area or grade.

Key Components of CBL from Competency Works:

- Students advance upon mastery.
- Competencies include explicit, measurable, transferable learning objectives that empower students.
- Assessment is meaningful and a positive learning experience for students.
- Students receive timely, differentiated support based on their individual learning needs.
- Learning outcomes emphasize competencies that include application and creation of knowledge, along with the development of important skills and dispositions.

s a part of the District's 2014–2017 Strategic Plan, Fraser Public Schools has adopted a new Learning Management System (LMS). The new LMS, *itslearning*, will offer a unique platform to provide flexible, standards-aligned courses for students.

"Based upon our K–12 needs, Fraser Public Schools was able to identify and adopt *itslearning* as our LMS," said Ms. Carrie Wozniak, Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction. "The District is in the midst of developing a K–12 curriculum focused on the competencies that demonstrate what we want a Fraser graduate to know and be able to do, which is why the decision to move forward with *itslearning* is so important."

The first goal of the District's strategic plan states: Fraser Public Schools will customize the learning experience through the implementation of competency-based learning. Through adopting this new LMS and a common language, Fraser Public Schools students will soon have the ability to learn with options of choice, flexibility and personalization anytime, anywhere.

"As identified in our strategic plan, we want to create a flexible learning environment for our students; therefore, we needed an LMS that not only provides students with content and resources beyond the traditional school day, but also serves as a place for teachers to design and store curriculum in a meaningful way," said Wozniak. Currently, *itslearning* is being piloted in grades 3–6 in Fraser Public Schools. Teachers in these grade levels have created a homeroom class within *itslearning* for students to access content, calendars and other resources. During the third trimester, the District's fourth-grade teachers will begin piloting course content.

"itslearning not only provides our teachers with the ability to deliver content and manage courses, but also provides our staff with a curriculum management piece that other learning platforms didn't offer," said Wozniak.

Students in CBL Courses Take Early Exams

Over 1,100 early exams were taken at Fraser High School this month as a result of the success of students in Competency Based Learning (CBL) classes.

"By teacher invitation and parental approval, students who have proven their knowledge on all of the critical competencies have the opportunity to test early," said Dr. Michael Lonze, Principal of Fraser High School.

A CBL course at Fraser High School focuses on competencies that students must work towards proving knowledge. CBL allows students to demonstrate their understanding of the academic content.

Currently, over 70 percent of core classes at the High School are CBL.

"To qualify, students had to have met all of the critical competencies in the course with a minimum score of 60 percent on each competency, and a minimum of 80 percent in the course overall," said Dr. Lonze.

In addition to finishing exams earlier than scheduled, students who qualified and tested early were able to pace out their testing schedule for their remaining exams.

Additionally, this process also allowed extra remediation for the students who did not complete their exams early, but rather, used the time to garner additional classroom support.

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HealthierUS School Challenge Awards FPS Elementary Buildings



Five of Fraser's elementary buildings are making headlines by working to support and improve the health of our students and our community. As part of their efforts, healthy items are featured on their menus, and physical education and activity are emphasized. Their efforts are part of the HealthierUS School Challenge (HUSSC).

Disney, Edison, Eisenhower, Emerson and Salk qualified for the bronze-level HUSSC award this school year. Fraser's Food Service Director Ms. Carrie Morfino led the HUSSC application process. In the 2012–2013 school year, Twain proudly received this distinction, as well.

The HealthierUS School Challenge is a voluntary national certification initiative for schools participating in the National School

Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program. It supports First Lady Michelle Obama's *Let's Move* campaign by recognizing schools that are creating healthier school environments through their promotion of good nutrition and physical activity.

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

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In Fraser Public Schools, our goal is to take the necessary steps to create a learning environment that allows our students to move at a learning pace that is personalized and customized for each child. Developing a competency-based learning model is a tremendous challenge for a traditional public school system, given our current model has always been based upon a cohort model where students are assigned to a grade level depending upon their age and progress through their academics at the same pace as their classmates — regardless of whether they have demonstrated the ability to learn at a different pace or if they require additional time to show mastery of the content.

When I consider the driving force behind the need to create this new learning model in our District, I think about the many families I know who have more than one child attending our schools. Each of these children are unique and wonderfully gifted in their own special way. They each have particular strengths and areas that need additional support. Yet, we ask each of them to learn at the same pace as their fellow classmates and lock them into a grade level and a fixed amount of time they must attend school. I realize this is the model that we all experienced as students; however, this model no longer fits today's students and their learning needs. Learning is happening in a very different way than when we attended school. Students access learning from a variety of resources and using whatever tool (phone, iPad, book, etc.) that best suits their learning style. As a school district, we have to respond to this new model by developing systems and instructional practices that allow students to "move on when ready" during their academic careers.

In this edition of our District newsletter, you will see several articles regarding the steps we are taking to develop this new system. In addition, you will begin hearing more from your classroom teachers, building principals, Board of Education members, and central office administrators regarding the challenges we are facing, our progress towards our goals, and the success we are experiencing.

FCAT Panel for RMS Quest Students

On January 12, Richards Middle School's seventh-grade Quest students attended a special panel presentation hosted by the Fraser Community Action Team (FCAT) Coalition. The panel, which featured FPS Police Liaison Officer Lisa Pettyes, RMS Assistant Principal Kris Robinson, and Linda Zott with CARE, addressed important topics such as bullying, sexting and social media. Additionally, students also heard from FHS Assistant Principal John Commyn and FHS senior Kristin Siciliano. The purpose was to ensure students remain aware of the policies and consequences put in place on these issues. Follow-up lessons will occur in the Quest classes at RMS, leading to future panel presentations.



Ramblers Helping Fellow Ramblers

After dismissal time at Fraser High School, the media center remains busy with students and staff on Tuesdays and Thursdays each week. This is thanks to a new after-school tutoring program that has started, allowing FHS students the opportunity to tutor their Rambler peers.

A process that originally began at the school year's August orientation, students signed up for the opportunity to tutor other high school students. A completely volunteer-oriented



group centered on giving back, the after-school tutoring program features a number of student tutors that donate their time week after week, with anywhere between 30 and 40 students looking for tutoring assistance.

"I like helping people and sharing my knowledge," said sophomore and volunteer tutor Madison Nuorala. "I am helping someone understand something that I love. I can put a different twist on it to hopefully help other students grasp the concepts."

The group features several recurring tutors, including Nuorala, sophomore Stewart Mitchell, and junior Angelica Bacol. Subjects for tutoring help range from the core classes to foreign languages and even some electives.

"We are building a more personal relationship where we not only get work done, but also we're friendly with each other. It makes school a lot easier if you can come get help without feeling judged," said Nuorala.

The high school's administrators, along with several high school teachers, have teamed up to make sure the after-school tutoring opportunities continue for the high school students. Using the Ghost Typing application on their iPads, the students are improving their keyboarding skills by spending 30 minutes a day working though different lessons. Each lesson introduces new words and letter



combinations that the students must type while the application tracks the time it takes and the errors made. Students need to score 90 percent or better to move on to the next lesson. Using external keyboards and stands allows the students to gain experience with two-handed touch typing. This practice will improve the students' typing speed and accuracy.



Edison's 'Hour of Code'

The first-graders at Edison had a great time participating in this year's "Hour of Code." They worked together to problem solve and figure out how to be computer programmers. The boys and girls worked on *Angry Birds* and *Frozen* programs. They are already looking forward to next year!

Hoopingarner's team has won the overall national title the last two years and is on its way to winning the third in 2015.

April (Phillips) Wilkowski, FHS Class of 1999, was inducted into the University of Michigan's Women's Track and Field Hall of Fame on January 16 for throwing for the University's Track and Field team.

"I am incredibly proud to be associated with Michigan athletically and academically. But to be recognized in this way, to be in the Track and Field Hall of Fame with so many incredibly talented women, is more than I ever dreamed of. I couldn't be more honored," said Phillips.

Phillips, one of five individuals inducted at the event, earned All-American nods in a pair of events during her final two seasons in Maize and Blue where she finished fourth in the indoor shot put (51-7) and 10th in the outdoor hammer throw (194-1) during the NCAA Championships. Phillips earned the recognition three times overall, also throwing the hammer to a mark of 189-10 to earn All America status (Twelfth Place) at the 2002 championships. Phillips is a 2003 (outdoor) Conference Athlete of the Year Award recipient and earned All-Big Ten honors on five occasions. She still holds program records in the shot put (indoor: 55-0; outdoor: 53-11), 20-lb. weight throw (indoor: 63-1 ¼) and hammer (outdoor: 199-3).

"My time at FHS was great. I always felt as though the teachers were as vested in my future as I was and set me up for success. For me, the strong academic foundation I received was key for me to transition to the highly competitive curriculum at the University," said Phillips.
