District Receives Early Literacy Grant

Fraser Public Schools is excited to implement several initiatives to increase literacy for early elementary students. The District received a \$60,000 Additional Instruction Time Grant from the Michigan Department of Education for the 2016–2017 school year. The grant will benefit students in developmental kindergarten through 2nd grade at all of the District's six elementary schools and the Dooley Center.

"We are refocusing our efforts on the fundamentals of early childhood literacy, and making sure all of our students continue to be screened," said Carrie Wozniak, assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction.

All DK, kindergarten and 1st-grade classrooms will receive Zoo-phonics. This program takes several approaches to learning all aspects of language arts, including vocabulary development and articulation, based on phonics, according to the Zoo-phonics website.

According to the MDE website, the Early Literacy Initiative will be a major focus in the state during the next few years. Research shows that if students are not proficient in reading by 3rd grade, their chances of becoming proficient are minimal.

"We were looking at our data and looking at where the holes were, and thought teachers could benefit from some structured tools to help with the pre-reading skills," said Kate Fitzpatrick, a District instructional consultant.

Students will be screened at the beginning, middle and end of the school year through aimsweb, which is a universal program that identifies students who need extra interventions in order to be proficient in reading.

Students will be monitored more often if they begin struggling with reading skills,



according to Fitzpatrick. "This allows us to keep a little tighter focus on the kids. We'll be able to respond faster and more specifically to what their needs are."

The grant will allow students identified as needing extra help to receive additional supports and interventions in order to be reading at grade level by 3rd grade.

"Being proficient by 3rd grade is important because that's the transition from learning to read to reading to learn," said Wozniak. It is also the first year students take the M-STEP, and reading comprehension is extremely important.

The District is already planning on re-applying for the grant for the 2017–2018 school year.

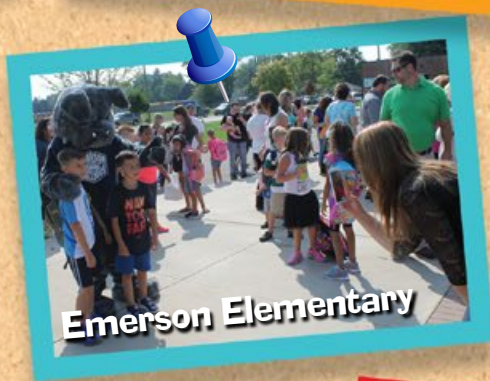
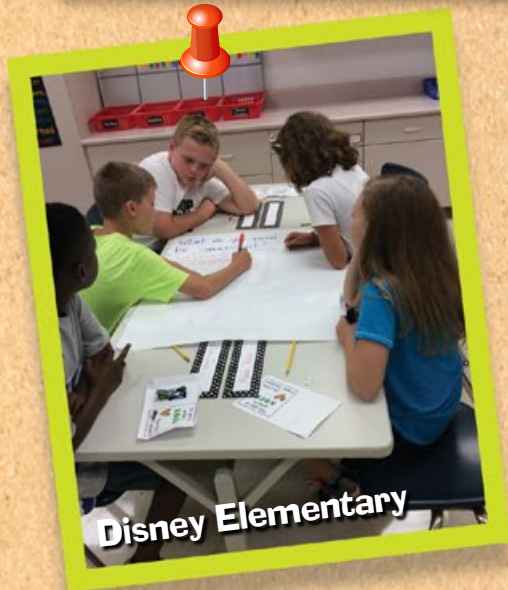

Fraser Hosts Galileo Teacher Conference

More than 200 teachers, principals and administrators from Macomb, Oakland and Wayne counties gathered at Fraser High School for the Galileo Leadership Conference. The August 10 event, which included almost 50 staff from all of Fraser's schools, gave the attendees an opportunity to learn from each other and share success stories.

"It gets you inspired again, and gets you started on the right foot," said Dayna Taylor, a 2nd-grade teacher at Eisenhower Elementary. "It's good for us to share, and it reiterates that what we're doing is on the right track."

Galileo is a teacher leadership consortium in the tri-county area. This year's conference was titled, "Learning Unlocked. Finding Meaning, Purpose and Joy."

"Galileo — and programs that foster teacher leadership — are important because it gives teachers a voice as education evolves," said Mary Thompson, Coordinator of Student Services at Richards Middle School and conference chair. "Galileo exposes teachers to cutting-edge research and data, to best practices for the 21st Century, and asks them to take it to their home districts in order to make their schools even better."

Michelle Goy, a 2nd-grade teacher at Eisenhower, said she was inspired to try new things this year after attending a breakout session and listening to a fellow teacher share her experiences.

"She piloted it in her classroom and it's great to hear her perspective," Goy said. "She gave us a lot



of resources," and will be available throughout the year for support, if needed.

Jarod McGuffey, a teacher at Disney Elementary, co-led a breakout session on using technology to incorporate critical thinking, collaboration, communication and creativity in the classroom.

"The conference was refreshing and inspiring," McGuffey said. "It really helped teacher-leaders to unlock their potential."

The new assistant principal at Fraser High School, Jason Ohrt, also had an opportunity to attend the one-day conference. "It's a great networking opportunity," he said. "It gave me good insight into where I'm headed this year."

"It is vital for teachers to communicate in very real ways, because we're the ones who are immersed in contemporary education, and when teachers get together and start talking about solutions instead of problems, we start to revolutionize education," Thompson said.



TWAIN FAMILIES MEET NEW PRINCIPAL

Mark Twain Elementary parents and students filled the media center in late August to meet their new principal, Mr. Gary Abud. The meet and greet was held during a Parent Club meeting, and offered families a chance to meet Mr. Abud before the first day of school.

Parents had an opportunity to introduce themselves and their children, and to ask questions of Mr. Abud. One of the things parents wanted to know was his stance on bullying.

"We don't want bullying in a school, and we also don't want it outside of school," Mr. Abud told the crowd. "It's gone far beyond the Dennis the Menace stereotype. It comes in a lot of different forms. My approach is not just to prevent it, but to be proactive and make sure we're taking a positive approach to behavior."


Other questions came from students, wondering what changes they could expect from last year, to whom Mr. Abud replied that he would not be coming in and making big changes.

After parents were finished asking questions, Mr. Abud followed up with a few of his own. He asked the families what makes Twain unique?

"They always say it takes a village," said parent Steve Dobek. "There's so many times we've come to a Parent Club meeting and there's times when we have a student who needs help ... it's not stuff we advertise [that the Parent Club does], but we come together to help out."

The other parents echoed that commitment and told him Twain families are close-knit and always there for each other.

"We do things because it's the right thing to do," said Parent Club President Roni Vanderford.

FHS Band Performs at Detroit Jazz Fest

The Fraser High School Jazz Band was one of only three high school bands selected to perform at the Detroit Jazz Festival. Students took the main stage at Campus Martius on September 3.

"To make a pun, the kids were "jazzed" about the opportunity to play such a prestigious event! Many students who had graduated and already started college came back to attend rehearsals and the performance," said Band Director Jim Rodgers.

The band qualified to apply for the honor after receiving a First Division rating at the MSBOA State Jazz Festival. The application process also included a letter of recommendation, a statement from Rodgers, and a copy of the Festival performance.

Rodgers said they were notified in June, just before the school year ended. The notification letter from the Detroit Jazz Festival Committee said, "We have identified your band as one of the premier youth jazz ensembles in the state of Michigan, and we will be proud to feature your students on a main stage at the festival this year."

This is the fourth time that the Fraser Jazz Ensemble has been selected to perform at the Detroit Jazz Festival. They also performed in 2007, 2008 and 2014.

WEB Experience Helps Students Connect with New School

Making the transition from elementary to middle school can be challenging, so all incoming 7th-graders were invited to attend the Where Everybody Belongs (WEB) orientation in late August. About 300 students took part in the event, which offered an opportunity for the students to meet some of their teachers and new classmates and become familiar with their new school building. The students worked through several ice-breaker and decision-making activities during the experience.

"As you go through middle school, we want you to figure out who you are. Who are you going to be?" WEB leader Mary Thompson said to the students.

The WEB experience is a national middle school orientation program that builds on the belief that students can help students succeed. Thompson also trained 8th-grade students during the summer to be WEB mentors. Those students also attended the experience with the incoming students and will continue to help them throughout the school year.

"Intentional transition programs like WEB help students recognize they have a place at the new school, that they can be successful, that they are joining a new community that cares for them. It takes one very big fear — the unknown — away from our new students and helps them realize they belong," said Thompson.



The effect the experience had on the students was immediate.

"I was impressed with how big of an impact this program had on the incoming 7th-graders," said one of the RMS teachers. "They came into the gym very nervous and scared, and in the span of four hours, they left laughing and relaxed. This was really cool."



FPS Athletics Praised for Outstanding Sportsmanship
